The workplace study

Components of a well design office space should:

- 1. Be designed and built with change in mind. Businesses don't stand still and change is inevitable
- 2. Have its form reflect its function. The two should mirror one another closely
- 3. Promote areas for informal contact
- 4. Facilitate and encourage teamwork
- 5. Have a central communal point that draws people together (tea point, canteen, display areas)
- 6. Provide sensory stimulation via the correct use of light, colour, furniture and space
- 7. Create a stunning first impression
- 8. Enhance and reflect your corporate image/brand

Open plan offices vs cellular offices

Advantages

- Increased collaboration and communication, without the requirement of high degrees of acoustic privacy resulting in a highly efficient use of space

- 3. Cheaper than cellurised office
- 4. Suited to multi-use environments

Disadvantages

- 1. Reduced privacy
- 2. Increased sensory distractions
- 3. Surveys suggest they're more popular
- 4. Little control over working environment

Reducing workplace stress to improve productivity

It is generally accepted that a better workplace can increase staff productivity and therefore profits. There are a number of things you can do to reduce sensory distractions and fatigue:

- 6. Use colour to stimulate productivity
- 7. Control Aroma
- 8. Provide relaxation areas
- 9. Enable localised thermal control
- 10. Specify environmentally friendly materials

Furniture & storage

Choosing the right furniture is likely to be a collaborative approach where employees roles and duties dictate the type and style of furniture needed. The first steps to take when looking at furniture should be:

- 1. Conduct an audit of furniture and storage that you have already in your workplace. Develop a list of what you are likely to keep and what needs to be replaced.
- 2. Research and compile a list of alternative solutions for new furniture and storage solutions.
- **3.** Experiment with different designs and layouts with different types of furniture and calculate space savings you can make with improved storage solutions.

IT systems

IT requirements for employees needs to keep pace with the changes in working habits and demands for flexible working. Cloud based technology means there has been a huge reduction in the need for desktop computers and an increase in the use of personal devices being used for work purposes.

In order to make sure you get the best from your technology when you are looking to refurbish your workplace, you can take the following first steps:

- 1. Undertake a technology audit and work out a long term strategy for IT.
- 2. Research the IT strategies of your competitors and market leading companies to see if there are any lessons to learn from their approaches.
